The Breathing Suite: A Community-Based Arts-Integration Project to Combat Stress in Black College Youth

Armond Dorsey (They/He) is an artist-researcher who utilizes quantitative and qualitative data collection methods to investigate root causes of stress. These research data inform their arts intervention praxis, Armond's original approach combining arts-based inquiry with mixed research methods to create arts-based interventions involving music composed with evidence-based approaches to modulate neural activity. Armond demonstrates their arts intervention praxis through their thesis project, The Breathing Suite, a participatory music intervention integrating poetry with music-guided slow-breathing to reduce stress while immersing audiences in a dream-like soundscape of breath. Armond will present findings from their research, overviewing their experimental design, compositional process, and participant responses. Bans on family visitation during the COVID19 pandemic created significant challenges for postoperative engagement and orientation in older adults. To address this gap, we explored whether a proactive partnership with our Healing Arts program would facilitate geriatric patient engagement. Our targeted healing arts visitation program resulted in positive feedback from staff and patients and future evaluation of its effects on delirium rates is planned.

Positive Exposure is a New York City-based nonprofit organization that uses photography to empower and humanize people with physical differences. Last spring, Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center (DHMC) hosted a Positive Exposure exhibition featuring portraits of people with visible physical differences namely due to genetic disorders. The mission of this initiative was to help fight stigma and create a more inclusive community. The exhibition was paired with a narrative medicine experience in which participants responded to writing prompts either in a facilitated group or through a self-guided option. The prompts invited participants to imagine the specifics of what life might be like for some of the people featured in the portraits. We will share an analysis of submitted reflections from a range of community members and explore the role of narrative medicine as a method for building perspective-taking skills and increasing inclusivity.
